



Thank you to Louise Zimmer's children who fulfilled their mother's dream. What a wonderful legacy and tribute to this amazing lady Louise's children presented the first royalty check from Louise's book "The Fireglass" to the HSOV on December 7, 2017 ....

"Louise Zimmer, who died December 21, 2015, was a well-known historian, storyteller and author of the Ohio Valley. She lived in Marietta, where she worked at the Washington County Public Library for 18 years as reference librarian and head of the History/Genealogy Department before retiring in 1992. She was the author of books, a newspaper column, and a long-running radio series, "Pioneer City Past."

By these, Zimmer left a legacy of invaluable history writings, which continue with her fourth book and only work of fiction. Zimmer completed this only a short time before her death. Entitled "The Fireglass: A Pioneer Tale of the Ohio Valley", the novel was published by Louise Zimmer's children who wanted to make their mother's dream a reality.

The Fireglass tells the story of Peter Shamokin, a young man who comes of age amid neglect and sorrow in the high-risk environment of the Ohio frontier in the late eighteenth century.



Despite his hard existence, Peter finds some solace and contentment. He possesses a fireglass, a gift given to him by a trader for a favor, which serves as both a magnifying glass and a fire starter.

Then, one day, Peter rescues a baby from among the bodies of her murdered family in the wreckage of a flatboat. He names her Dinah and resolves to take care of her, and from that moment on, his life forever changes. Although history is being made in the Ohio Valley, Peter manages to avoid becoming involved, living his life instead only through the needs of his new daughter until history closes in to at last touch her.

Louise Zimmer's children dedicated the publication of this, her last work, in her loving

memory, whose work touched many lives and whose love, encouragement, support, and strength for her family shaped their lives. The book is available locally in the gift shops of Campus Martius Museum in Marietta and Blennerhassett Museum in Parkersburg. It is also available online through Amazon and other retailers.

All royalties will be donated to the Humane Society of the Ohio Valley in Marietta Ohio."

(with assistance from our kennel techs and volunteers) raised Hope and Faith to be happy, playful youngsters in spite of growing up in a shelter environment.

Hope had a white short smooth coat, a long tail, and a darling face with a chocolate brown button nose, patches of brown around both of her eyes, and the cutest white-and-brown spotted short floppy ears. Hope had the sweetest facial expressions and actually 'smiled' when she was looking at her favorite person in the world .. Humane Officer *Jon* 





McIntire <sup>©</sup> And the feeling was mutual <sup>©</sup> <sup>©</sup> Hope was the last of the girls to be photographed during their photo session on August 31<sup>st</sup> and the volunteer who took their pictures had tears rolling down her cheeks as she watched Hope bestowing kisses on Jon's face when their photo session was over .. and Jon was hugging/kissing her in return. Jon confided that it was Hope whom he credited with rescuing this little family. This little angel weighed approximately 45 lbs. She was still perfecting her walking-on-a-leash skills but did very well after she had been outdoors with you for a few minutes and gained her self-confidence to walk beside you.

Baby and Faith were adopted together on October 12<sup>th</sup>. We felt sad for Hope at that time (being left alone) but realized several weeks later that there was a perfect home waiting for Hope that we did not yet know about ......





Unbeknownst to us, the nicest young woman (*Hanna Sinnett*) had seen Hope's pictures/story on Facebook/ Petfinder and felt she would be a perfect addition to their family. Hanna came to meet Hope in person, and there was an instant connection between them. Hope was adopted on December 1<sup>st</sup> 2017 and, true to her loving nature, she was giving good-bye kisses to HSOV kennel techs and volunteers and also lots of kisses to her new momma ❤ We were overthe-moon happy for Hope! Naturally we took photos of Hope with her new momma as she left the shelter to begin the next chapter in her life ❤ ❤



On the evening of December  $2^{nd}$  we received a message from Hanna which brought happy tears to our eyes (and perhaps explained why Hope was not adopted back in October with her mother and sister):



"Hey we adopted the white female Pit Bull Hope yesterday. Hope took to my autistic daughter (Thalia) and my nonverbal little girl actually talks to her and calls her Poppy! We love Hope, perfect match"

Hanna wrote a few days later that "Hope is perfect, and we love her so much! She and our other dog get






along great, and we take them to the park for walks together."

When we learned the miraculous part of the story about Hope and Hanna's autistic daughter Thalia, we understood the reason why Hope wasn't meant to be adopted with her mother/sister. There was a bigger role that Hope was destined to play in Thalia's life •


We realize that discussing money is a delicate subject but want to share a glimpse of our 'household' finances with supporters and to be transparent about what it takes to keep the HSOV operating each month. Thanks to HSOV Board of Directors Treasurer *Amy Rogers* for providing this financial information.

## HSOV Finances At A Glance (Figures Based On Fiscal Years 2016-2017)



### **INCOME:**

The HSOV operates on an average of \$38,337 per month. Most income is not received on a monthly basis and instead comes in quarterly or when fundraisers take place. A breakdown of income sources by percentage is shown in this pie chart. Program income includes adoptions, microchipping, and other services provided by the shelter; reimbursement of veterinary care for animals that go to rescue; and public donations that are earmarked to offset vet bills.



### **EXPENSES:**

HSOV expenses average \$40,679 per month. A breakdown of expenses by percentages is shown in this pie chart. Program expenses include all animal-related care (vaccinations, wormer, cleaning supplies, food, etc) with the exception of veterinary care which is listed as a separate expense. Operating expenses include facility costs, office supplies, accounting services, and utilities.

So you can see that, on average, HSOV runs on a deficit of \$2,342 per month or \$28,104 per year. We are including several ways to donate so that the HSOV can continue to give Washington County Ohio animals the best care possible

The IRA (Individual Retirement Account) Charitable Rollover is a fantastic way to make a tax-free donation to the Humane Society of the Ohio Valley. If you are 70-1/2 years or older, you can make arrangements with your IRA administrator to transfer your donation directly from your IRA account to the HSOV or to our accounts at the Marietta Community Foundation. Individuals can make a gift up to \$100,000 to satisfy the required minimum distribution from your IRA, and the gift will not be taxed as income to you. As always, be sure to check with your financial advisor for specific details.

**Three Funds Are Maintained at the Marietta Community Foundation** (100 Putnam Street, Marietta OH 45750) for the benefit of the HSOV. Donations made to these funds are tax-deductible and are also a great way to help the shelter and HSOV animals:

- Humane Society of the Ohio Valley: Foundation/Agency Fund [General fund for shelter expenses]
- 2) Humane Society of the Ohio Valley: Medical Fund
  [Established to provide resources for medical purposes of shelter animals]

### The HSOV participated in the Marietta Community Foundation's 2017

**Grant-Your-Grant Contest** which was held November 12-18, 2017. The theme for the 2017 Challenge was "Reflecting The Past, Celebrating The Present". Non-profit organizations that currently held an Agency Fund at MCF were eligible to submit two photos that best captured the essence of how their organization had evolved (one photo from the past and one from the present which illustrated where your organization was and where you are now). A brief 50-word description was also permitted to accompany the photos. The photos were posted on the Marietta Community Foundation Facebook page and the three entrants' photos which received the most "likes" by November 18th were to receive a portion of the matched funds.

As our entry we chose past/present photographs of our HSOV Humane Officers (**Butch Morris/Levi Seevers** for the past; **Jon McIntire** for the present) with the description:



"Since our charter in 1888 the HSOV has been the voice for abused/neglected animals in Washington County Ohio. The first paid employee was a Humane Officer and our staff/humane officers proudly continue that tradition. Dogs/cats receive loving care and medical attention while they await their new homes."



Thank you to everyone who voted for the Humane Society of the Ohio Valley in the Marietta Community Foundation 2017 Grant Your Grant Contest. Please know how much we appreciate each individual who voted in this Grant-Your-Grant Challenge and those who support the HSOV in so many ways ♣ The winners were announced on November 20, 2017 and our shelter's photo entries (Humane Officers with dogs) had a total of 1,139 "Likes" which put us in First Place. We were awarded \$6,000 (which was deposited in our account at Marietta Community Foundation). Eve Inc, Marietta Band Boosters, and Marietta Main Street were also winners and received grants totaling \$5,500, \$5,000, and \$4,000 respectively.



We can also schedule orientations on an alternate day if Sundays are inconvenient. Ginger Eubank, Julie Lowther, Amy Rogers, and Beth Underwood are always ready and eager to provide orientation sessions foe new volunteers as well ©

An enhancement to our volunteer orientation program in 2017 requires that you complete a "Three Shadows And You're In" before being presented with your official HSOV Volunteer Badge & Lanyard. After attending general orientation, you will be required to complete three separate 'shadowing' sessions with an experienced dog walker before walking dogs by yourself. This gives new volunteers a little more confidence in handling dogs and also gives you an opportunity to become acquainted with fellow volunteers. 
## **Eagle Scout Service Project**



### History Of The Humane Society Of The Phio Valley

he first Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals was founded in New York City in 1866. On January 11, 1884, the Washington County Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals was organized in the City of Marietta, Ohio. It was incorporated with the Secretary of State of the State of Ohio on February 9, 1888. It is thought to be the first charter of its kind in the State of Ohio (Charter No. 8321). The early workers of the Society did not content themselves with investigating cases of cruelty to just animals, but also investigated homes where the parents were neglecting children. In 1901, the Society re-organized and Kitty Nye became the secretary, holding this position for 20 years. In 1906, the Society set minimum standards for crates and coops for the shipping of ducks, turkeys, chickens, etc. That year, Society members asked local merchants to put out boxes at Christmas time where residents might place food to be given to needy families. The Society contacted the Salvation Army to distribute the food collected. In 1910, Kitty Nye attended the first International Humane Conference, which was held in Washington, D.C.

In 1948, a number of local residents became alarmed when the Marietta Daily Times published an article about the poisoning of a dog in the City. In 1950, Mrs. Columbia Bennett was named president and Augusta Kortrecht was named secretary. These two women, with Doris Gracey and a number of other dedicated people in the City, contacted other people for \$1.00 dues to support the work of the Society. There was no animal shelter, so some of the members kept the animals in their homes. Mr. and Mrs. Bennett sold their dining room furniture in order to make room for 32 puppies housed in rabbit pens in their home. They fed the puppies every three hours and also had many full-grown dogs. Mrs. Kortrecht would walk stray dogs on leashes. When people admired the animals, she would inform them that the dogs were available for adoption. The women in the Society furnished the food most of the time. Rolled oats and milk was fed to the puppies. Joe Richards, who owned a local feed store, often donated 25 pounds of feed. Eventually, all of the feed stores in the area donated food. In 1951, a group rented a barn on Sand Hill. Freda Schimmel paid the first month's rent and the first veterinarian bills. The neighbors in the Sand Hill community donated milk and Harold Radekin, humane officer, worked for four months using his own car without any pay.

In 1953, the first office was opened at 102 S. Third Street, where members of the Society took turns staffing the office. Later that year, the office was moved to 114 N. Fourth Street. Since there were no funds available, the early records were kept on the backs of used Christmas cards. The Sugden Book Store later donated a ledger to the Society. Miss Nye, at her death, left a bequest to the Society and some of the money was used to purchase a used Jeep. Another part of the money was used to start the shelter at Dodd's Run Road. Since funds were very limited, the furnishings were donated. Hayward Strecker donated a desk and Doris Gracey donated chairs. There was real community involvement. Many times the meter men, the mail men, or truck drivers would report cases to the humane officer, or they would often bring strays tci the shelter. In April of 1960, the shelter was forced to close because of lack of funds. During that period, the animals were cared for in the homes of members. The shelter was re-opened in August of 1960 and Homer Nichols was named humane officer. He was the only paid employee. All other work was done by volunteers.

In November of 1979, the Society re-organized under the name of the Washington County Humane Society. In early 1980, a building campaign, headed by Attorney William Fields and his wife, Prudence, was started to build a new shelter on land leased · from the Washington County Commissioners. In August of 1982, the ground was leveled on Sherlock Drive (off of Mt. Tom Road) at the new site. Most of the supplies and labor were donated by the community and the trade unions. The architect was Richard Dybiec and the \_construction superintendent was Charlie Sherlock. In December of 1982, in order to resolve the problem of the citizens thinking that the Society was funded by Washington County, the Society, under the presidency of Jim Schafer, resolved that the name be-changed to the Humane Society of the Ohio Valley. A crematory was later added through the efforts of Jim and GeAevieve Schafer, long-time members of the Society. It has since been dismantled, due to age and cost of operating.


## 2018 WASHINGTON COUNTY DOG LICENSES

Residents of Washington County Ohio are reminded that you must purchase a 2018 license for your dog by January 31, 2018. The Ohio Revised Code Section 955.010.05 mandates that all dogs over 3-months old must be licensed by January 31st or 30 days after the dog becomes 3-months old.

Licenses are available at the Washington County Auditor's Office, 205 Putnam Street, Marietta OH (Monday-Friday 8:00am-5:00m) either in person or by mail for a cost of \$16.00 plus postage. They may also be purchased online at www.doglicenses.us/OH/Washington (credit card payments only/processing fees apply). After January 31st, statutory late penalty increases the licensing fee to \$32.00 per dog.

You may also purchase 2018 dog licenses/tags at the HSOV (Tuesday-Friday 11:00am-5:00pm and Saturday-Sunday 11:00am-4:00pm) for a cost of \$16.75.

Having a current dog tag on your dog's collar is very important to help reunite you and your beloved pet in the event that he/she becomes lost and is brought to our shelter. The shelter staff will contact you and ensure that your dog will be held for 14 days before it is made available for adoption (stray hold is three days without a tag). An online database (which includes dog tag numbers from 2015-present) also makes it possible for individuals to locate the owner of a lost dog who is wearing a tag. That database can be accessed on the www.doglicenses/us/OH/Washington website under 'License Searches'.
