Whether it's walking dogs on Saturdays or helping with fundraisers, I appreciate what you do. I have to say to Celeste Ridgway and her rescue crew .. Thank You. You are very much a vital part. Without rescues we would be in trouble since we cannot adopt that many animals in this area compared to the numbers of animals who come in. Thank you to all adopters and foster homes for opening your hearts and homes to new members into your families. Thank you Sharon Paul for all of the hard work you do to photograph, tell the stories of the animals, name them, post them to Petfinder/Faceook, e-mail, and everything else I missed. Also the work you do with the cats especially. Thank you to my staff. It's a thankless job sometimes. Unless you work it day in and day out, you do not realize the stress and pressures of trying to take care of (and love like your own) every one of the animals that need a second chance at life. Knowing every day may not turn into the day you would like it to be.

"Shy Guy" made his debut at the HSOV on April 5, 2014, and it seemed that he had led a pretty rough life ⁽²⁾ He was a 5-year old orange/white cat with a rather rugged-looking appearance, but his face was angelic and melted your heart the moment you saw him ⁽²⁾ "Shy Guy" had suffered frost-bite on his right ear and the top half of that ear was missing .. and his hair was very sparse on his back and legs. In spite of his rough life, "Shy Guy" had an extremely friendly, outgoing personality and absolutely loved people and attention.

"Shy Guy" had many admirers, but nobody offered to give him a home. He sat patiently in his small cage for over two months waiting for someone to realize how special he was ...

Little did we realize that "Shy Guy" actually had a long-distance admirer in the State of Maine who saw his picture on Facebook in early May 2014 and had fallen in love with him .. *Sara Wasson* vowed that somehow she would give "Shy Guy" the best home ever.

When transportation efforts didn't work out, Sara took matters into her own hands and decided that she would book a flight and personally make the journey to adopt "Shy Guy" ⁽ⁱ⁾

Sara's journey paralleled the movie "Trains, Boats, and Planes" ... except that her version was entitled "Buses, Planes, Motels, and Cars" ⁽²⁾ ⁽²⁾ Sara booked a flight to Pittsburgh PA, rented a car, booked a motel room, and then drove to Marietta, Ohio on the afternoon of June 9, 2014.

from our kennel techs. About a week later, "Yul" went to a great foster home with *Jessica Carver* where he was given extra TLC and, thanks to the HSOV and *Dr. Gwen McHenry*, he received excellent medical care.

"Yul Brenner" came back to the shelter for new photos on March 14th and looked like

a "Cat Fancy Magazine" cover boy 😳 He had a large fan club, and we were sure he would find a home quickly since everyone LOVED this big handsome guy 😊



"Yul" was healthy enough to be neutered on March 28th and came through that procedure with 'flying colors'. But his old leg injury continued to bother him, and he underwent surgery on May 13, 2014 for the removal of his left hind leg. "Yul" quickly adjusted to life without that bad leg, and the only thing he considered a source of irritation was the dreaded 'cone of shame' that he had to endure for a few days while he recuperated ⁽³⁾ But his pleasant, loving personality was always there, and he just became more handsome with each passing day ⁽³⁾

As it turned out, **"Yul"** had an admirer who had seen his newest glamour photos and read his updated description on the HSOV listings on Petfinder.com. Nearly four years ago I retired from a career that spanned over 40 years. Needless to say, I suddenly had a lot of free time on my hands. To fill in some of that time, my wife and I started volunteering at the Humane Society of the Ohio Valley (driving fur people to spay and neuter clinics, walking dogs, petting cats, kittens, dogs, and puppies ... whatever we could do to help these wonderful fur people that had no voice). It was something we could do not for personal recognition, not for any financial rewards, but because it was something that needed to be done and we had the time to do it.

Now bear in mind, prior to this I was one of those folks that was intimidated by nearly any dog over the size of a Chihuahua or the demeanor of a Beagle. And I had always thought that the HSOV was the last stop of the train for unwanted animals. It didn't take me long to



discover that kindness, compassion, and a gentle voice could often overcome the fur people that were the wards of the HSOV. And it was NOT the last stop but rather a way station for finding forever, loving homes for these wonderful

So every Saturday I would go to the HSOV and walk

said he was a Chow mix and his name was Brutus and he was around 11 years old. And weighed nearly 60 pounds.



Not the kind of dog, or size of dog, I would have been drawn to before I retired. After all, Chows were mean right? Wrong. This particular dog said more to me with his eyes than any



other dog I have ever seen. So, yes, I put a leash on him and away we went. Not for a 20 minute walk but nearly an hour! And every Saturday after I would go out and

Brutus would be waiting for me at the front of his run and off we'd go over hills, through the brush, over the fields, and back.

Right after Thanksgiving of 2013 my wife and I decided to foster Brutus and brought him home

Shortly after that we enrolled him in a dog obedience class. He, and I, learned a lot. To make a long story just a little shorter, shortly after Brutus and I became Dog Obedience School graduates my wife and I decided that Brutus had found his forever, loving home.

And yes, we adopted him. But over the course of time from that September Saturday when I first met this sad, scared dog in the back of his run at the HSOV till now a really, really neat companion that loves me unconditionally he changed. He was no longer Brutus, the scared, sad fur person afraid of everything but rather Brutus the Wonder Dog. My pal, my buddy, that taught me that love comes in all shapes and sizes. That I no longer feared bigger dogs. That anyone can find a particular breed of dog in a newspaper, on line, or where ever but the truly; truly greatest breed of dog is most often at your local animal shelter, just waiting to fill that space in your life you didn't know you had, and quite often that breed is not a pure bred so to speak but pure love.

"PRECIOUS" IS LAID **TO REST**

A tragic story unfolded in our small city (Marietta, Ohio) on the morning of Wednesday, May 21st, 2014 when a gentleman reported finding

a tiny Pomeranian in a trash dumpster by the Bantam Baseball League concessions stand. James Brown, president of the Baseball League, discovered the small dog in an egg crate inside the dumpster. Washington County (Ohio) Dog Warden, Kelly Schubert-McGilton, was called to the scene and was heartbroken to see the frail, senior dog in what she described as a 'horrible' condition. HSOV Shelter Manager/Humane Officer, Steve Herron, also assisted.

After the dog was taken to Green Meadow Veterinary Hospital, doctors there determined that the elderly dog's kidneys had failed, in addition to having a broken leg, and was emaciated in her ribs, hips, back, and shoulders. She also had cataracts in both eyes and little to no muscle left, in addition to not being able to walk. It was decided that the most humane thing was to euthanize her.

<u>NOTE</u>: The preceding excerpts were from **The Marietta Times** (May 22, 2014) as well as WTAP-TV coverage of the story.

The Marietta Times reported the following day that an investigation by the Sheriff's Department had led to a likely arrest, and ironically, it was learned that this precious dog's name was indeed "Precious".

A memorial/graveside service was held at 2 o'clock on Friday, May 23, 2014 at East Lawn Pet Cemetery in Marietta, Ohio and "Precious" was laid to rest. East Lawn donated the cemetery plot and also provided a beautiful floral arrangement of pink roses in the shape of a dog bone/biscuit with Precious' name on the ribbon. HSOV Shelter Manager, Steve Herron, delivered the eulogy. Several animal lovers were in attendance to celebrate Precious' life and to mourn her passing. Senior Shelter Kitties complete a family!

It's always sad when senior kitties lose their homes, and our hearts ached for *"Dopey & Lilly"* when they were brought to the HSOV on March 22, 2014. Their elderly mistress had taken up residence in an assisted-living facility and could no



longer care for her beloved cats ☺

"Dopey" was a sweet 10-year old neutered/ declawed Tuxedo cat. This big boy weighed 18 lbs., and he was a pushover for attention © He seemed to have taken on the role of 'big brother' to his housemate "Lilly", and

they were very attached to each other.



"Lilly" was a lovely 16-year old spayed brown tabby who was obviously a senior citizen. She had lost her right eye as a youngster due to a bad infection in that eye, but she didn't seem to notice that she was different from any

other cat and had adapted to life with one eye. She had a sweet personality and would push her paws through the bars of their cage for attention.

These two lost souls depended upon each other, and we knew that they needed to find a home together. A few adopters offered to take "Dopey", but nobody seemed to want "Lilly" ^(C)

You can imagine our delight when our Feline Rescue Coordinator, Sharon Paul, told us that a special lady by the name of **Ann Ortmann** had seen Dopey & Lilly's photos on the HSOV facebook page and would love to adopt them together ⁽²⁾ She had experience with senior cats and had lost her beloved 16-year Bam to kidney failure in December, and



Bam also had just one eye. Ann offered a nice quiet home to these two seniors if we could find a way for them to travel to her home near Kalamazoo, Michigan. She completed her adoption application and had already begun to call them "Percy & Pearl" in anticipation of their new lives with her. Things took an unexpected turn when "Lilly/Pearl" required medical attention for a stomach upset/vomiting on April 1st and was found to be anemic ^(C) The diagnosis was a possible ulcer, but Ann was not discouraged and said that was even one more reason why she wanted to give "Lilly/Pearl" a good home ^(C)

Rescues, transport coordinators, and animal lovers will move 'heaven and earth' when shelter cats (and dogs) have a good home waiting for them. Our Transport Coordinator, *Celeste Ridgway*, arranged transportation to a pickup location about two hours from Ann's home and one of Ann's friends went the extra distance to deliver "Percy & Pearl" to their new home. That friend even provided an overnight stay for them.

Ann finally met "Percy & Pearl" on April 13, 2014 and has sent heartwarming updates about them over the past three months. They were slowly introduced into their new home, and Ann made beds for them wherever they chose to sleep. For the first few days/nights, they chose the closet next to Ann's bed, so she placed their plush donut beds in that closet where they could feel safe and secure. Then gradually they began to explore the rest of their new home and discovered that there were lots of comfy places to lounge during the day and be near Ann (and her son) for extra TLC and attention. *Ann's latest message says it all, and we hope her experience will encourage others to adopt senior shelter animals ...*

"Just wanted to give you an update on the babies. They both are doing very well, and Pearl HAS NOT been sick or vomiting since I got her. Percy is also doing well. They are both really wonderful cats and get along with the others. Pearl is sleeping with me every night, very close, and always sleeps on my bed. Percy also sleeps there most of the time, but he ventures around to the kitchen window and my cat room in the basement. Percy is still the big brother and stays close most of the time to Pearl, mainly sleeping with her on my bed. I am very happy that they are here as they are very sweet and loving, and I couldn't have asked for better kitties."
