## OPENING YOUR HOME TO FOSTER A SHELTER ANIMAL IS ONE WAY TO SAVE A LIFE ...

Perhaps there are animal lovers reading our newsletter who look at photographs of HSOV dogs and cats on our Petfinder/ Facebook pages and fall in love with them but aren't able to enter into a long-term commitment by adopting and giving them a permanent home. We'd like to let you know that there are other ways to help ©

We welcome sponsors who might be able to pay for the cost of spaying/neutering a dog or cat to increase their chances of finding a home. There are also varying degrees of sponsorship. For example .. paying the adoption fee for a cat (\$20) or sponsoring a combo test; paying for heartworm testing/rabies vaccine for a dog; or donating to help a specific dog or cat who needs some extra medical care when we post a plea for extra assistance.

Another important way to save a life is by providing a temporary home for a dog or cat through our Foster Program, and this doesn't have to be a long-term commitment on your part. There are many reasons why a dog/cat might need to be in a foster home, such as awaiting transport to rescue, socialization, pregnant/nursing mothers, or dogs/cats who aren't adapting to shelter life. And, of course, by fostering an animal in your home it opens up space in a cage/ kennel in our shelter so that animals are not euthanized because of space.

Fostering is very rewarding, and we guarantee that you will feel good about knowing what a difference you've made in the life of that one dog or cat. There are several foster moms (and dads) who would love to share their experiences with anyone interested in becoming a foster family. You would be required to complete a Foster Application Form for approval before choosing your shelter dog or cat to take home. Our Foster Program Committee members will be happy to answer questions. ### INTRODUCING ONE OF OUR WONDERFUL FELINE FOSTER MOMS .. KATHY WIGGINS

We are very thankful for each and every one of our wonderful foster moms who take cats, kittens, and nursing mother cats into their homes, and we are especially thankful that Kathy Wiggins and her family came to the HSOV on July 23, 2011 to ask how they could help



when they saw several URGENT cats on our website. They noticed a fraillooking calico kitten named "Chastity" who happened to be in a ferret cage in the lobby and took her home that day. "Chastity" received the TLC and vet care that she needed, and the Wiggins family had her spayed to increase her chances of being adopted. Of course, you've probably guessed that "Chastity" had already found her home even before Kathy realized it. She was officially adopted on October 28, 2011. That tiny kitten paved the way for many other cats and kittens to find their way to the "Wiggins Bed & Breakfast", and Kathy and her family have given countless kitties the big chance they needed to find homes or rescues.

Kathy is one of the "first responders" when cats are placed on the dreaded

URGENT status and quickly comes to the shelter to assess which of the kitties need her the most. Her most recent foster kitty (Sadie) was chosen because she had been at the shelter since September 27, 2012, and Kathy decided that Sadie deserved to feel the freedom of being able to stretch her legs in a real home after sitting in a cage for three months. Sadie had a reputation for being a bit anti-social at the shelter, but by the second evening in the Wiggins home, Sadie was lying next to Kathy wanting attention!

It has been heartwarming to see the teamwork that has developed between Kathy and another one of our foster moms (Jessica Carver) along with our wonderful Three Sisters Rescue friend (Lucy Betts). These three dynamic young ladies work together to assist each other when a foster cat needs some extra help, and they offer moral support when needed. Lucy has the expertise and can give 'long-distance' advice, and Kathy and Jessica sometimes 'tag' each other if they need to trade cats for some reason.

Kathy has a special fondness for tortoiseshell cats and admits she fell in love with two that she fostered, and they became "foster failures". But she still has enough love in her heart (and room in her home) that she continues to foster several HSOV cats/kittens at any given time.

This "thank you" wouldn't be complete without also thanking Kathy's husband, Leonard Wiggins, and their children Heather, Selena, & Corey. This is truly a "family affair", and they are all involved in the foster care program. Leonard has even brought foster kitties to the shelter at 5am to meet transports!

We sincerely thank Kathy Wiggins and the "Wiggins Bed & Breakfast for HSOV Kitties", and we hope that she and her family offer their hospitality for many years to come  $\bigoplus$ 

# BOBBY MCGEE ... "WHO RESCUED WHO?"

There are car magnets with this line, but in the case of *Ken Wright and "Bobby McGee"*, one really needs to ask the question "Who Really Rescued Who?"

**"Bobby McGee"** was a handsome 6-year old male black/brindle Labrador Retriever/Hound mix who was brought to the HSOV on August 7, 2012. He was a rather big boy who weighed ~70 lbs and was affectionately nicknamed "Boxcar" by our kennel techs because of his size ③ "Bobby McGee" especially

loved kennel tech **Bill Hagy** since Bill spent quality time with Bobby and took him for long walks. One of our favorite photos of "Bobby McGee" was of him looking up so lovingly at Bill. We were very sad when Bobby was placed on urgent status on October 5th, and it seemed that he might never find a home

On December 7th, *Animal Advocates* in Pittsburgh PA rescued "Bobby McGee" and placed him in a foster home with Ken Wright. Ken was looking for a new best friend. A former UPS employee, Ken was diagnosed with a degenerative condition which over the course of more than a dozen years eventually left him disabled. Ken is a very social, outgoing person with lots of friends, but his

mobility issues means that he can't just grab a movie or pop over to the bar with his buddies. Ken is a true animal lover, and a dog provides him

with much-needed company while his sister and niece (with whom he lives) are at work. The family already had a dog and a cat, but something was missing since his beloved German Shepherd, Missy, died a few months ago at the age of 7 years old due to cancer in spite of several rounds of chemotherapy.

When Ken heard about Bobby McGee ("McGee" as he is now known), Ken knew he could open his heart and his home to this handsome gentleman. An exuberant energetic younger dog would not be suitable. He was looking for a more mature, calmer, intuitive friend who would feel comfortable with Ken's power chair and would willingly listen to Ken's commands and synchronize with his schedule. At the same time, Ken knows that he

has lots to offer a dog as well .. 24/7 companionship, constant attention, a fenced-in yard and never-ending love.

"McGee" for his part is appreciative of his new arrangements. Perhaps sensing Ken's mobility limitations, McGee is very wary of strangers coming to the door until Ken calls him to his side .. at which time he just loves being petted and pampered. Ken for his part, loves having a friend he can call his own and looks forward to Spring when they can both bask in the sunshine and appreciate each new day again.

# A Happy Ending (and New Beginning) for "GRACIE"

We wish that we knew more about Gracie's life before she came to our shelter, but in a sense, her new life began the day she arrived on a cold wintery day on December 20, 2012. A farmer in Washington County, Ohio contacted our dog warden, Kelly Schubert, to report that he had found an old dog in his barn that morning and felt that someone had probably dumped her there. When Kelly arrived on the scene, it was apparent that this dog was indeed a 'senior citizen' and was also pretty frail  $\bigotimes$ 

This older girl was treated like royalty when she arrived at the shelter and given piles of soft blankets and plenty of nourishing food. One of our Humane Officers, Misty

Carpenter, chose the name "Gracie" the moment she saw her, and it seemed to describe this sweet dog perfectly.

For the first few days, Gracie seemed too tired to make the effort to stand up or walk. When we took her photographs for her introduction on Petfinder/Facebook, she would barely hold her head up. She was content to just sleep on her blankets. Gracie melted your heart when she looked up at you through cloudy eyes  $\textcircledightharpoonup She$  had a black-and-gray coat and a beautiful face with graying around her eyes and muzzle. Gracie was at least 13 years old. Though she weighed nearly 50 lbs., she was still painfully thin.

Gracie's sad eyes seemed to tell her story, and there were many kind-hearted volunteers who rallied around her to help this sweet girl. Gracie had many of the ailments that come with the privilege of growing old. She appeared to be deaf, had cloudy eyes, and arthritic joints. Over the next two weeks, our shelter staff gave her extra TLC and two volunteers (Sandra Brightwell and Kathy Mallett) provided private-duty nursing on a daily basis ③ Gracie was started on arthritis/pain/joint medication and was soon up walking around and looking forward to walks outside! It was touching to learn that Gracie was a pushover for Christmas cookies during one of the weekly HSOV Dog Walks.

Gracie had quite a fan club on our HSOV Facebook page. It turned out that a young couple, Amanda and Mike Uhl, were following her story and had already fallen in love with her by the time they came to the shelter in early January 2013 to meet her.

Amanda and Mike officially adopted "Gracie" on January 7, 2013, and there wasn't a dry eye in the shelter that day. Gracie must surely have felt like a movie star since she had so many well-wishers wanting to give her hugs and kisses  $\odot$  We have included a few pictures of Gracie with her new family the day that she left our shelter. Gracie's new life with Amanda and Mike Uhl is beautifully written through postings on Amanda's Facebook Timeline, which we are sharing with her permission ....

### January 5, 2013

"There is going to be a new addition to our family. Her name is Gracie, a 13-year old black Labrador mix who stole our hearts today. She is pretty much deaf and is arthritic. I couldn't bear the thought of her spending the last of her days in a shelter, so we are making her a part of our family. She will have a warm doggie bed, extra treats, and lots of love."

### January 7, 2013

"Grace is home. She's such a doll. She's been

scoping out the place and getting her lil belly full. Fatman (our cat whom we adopted from the HSOV several years ago) hissed at her once. The other two cats are hiding under the bed. So far, so good. She's now curled up on a blankie and snoring away."

### January 8, 2013

"Gracie is such a good dog. I don't understand why anyone would dump her out. She moves slow, but that's okay, I do too. Bless that little girl's heart."

### January 16, 2013

"Gracie likes bagels and cream cheese! She stole mine off the counter when I wasn't looking."

### January 19, 2013

"I just wanted to give an update on Gracie. We've had her for almost two weeks now. She is such a doll. She follows us around everywhere. Like you guys said, she is pretty much deaf. She can hear really loud sounds (like sneezing or pans rattling). Other than that she doesn't hear (or pay attention) to much. She has really warmed up to Mike (I think she loves him more ..lol). She pretty much knows his work schedule now and knows the approximate time he will be home. It's soo cute!! We do think that she was at least housetrained. She goes to the door when she needs out and has only had one accident .. which was my fault because I couldn't find my shoes! She stole my bagel off the table when I wasn't looking. So she likes bagels and cream cheese. I feel so sorry for her sometimes. You can tell she wants to run and play (chase our kitties) but the ole girl just can't move fast. She hasn't barked, whined, or cried. She's an angel. Thanks to all of you who took care of her before she came home to be with us. We love her, and it seems that she has been with us the last 13 years."

"Gracie snoring is my favorite new sound."

### February 8, 2013

"Gracie is doing wonderful. It's like we've had her all along. I can't wait till the weather warms up so she can get out there and walk. I think this cold weather hurts her little body."

Thank you, Amanda and Mike, for giving Gracie such a loving home and sharing these wonderful updates about the new chapter in her life. We hope that writing about your experience adopting an older dog will inspire other families to give older dogs a second chance at the good life~

### FOUR "SPECIAL NEEDS" KITTIES FIND HOMES/RESCUES

*W*e believe that all of the kitties who find themselves in our shelter are special as well as beautiful, but when we place that little green heart next to their names on Petfinder, it donates that they are special in quite a different sense .. because they have 'special needs'. Our hearts sink when cats or kittens with vision problems come into the shelter for fear that nobody will want to give them a home⊛We've had four vision-impaired kitties who found homes/rescues recently and wanted to share pictures of these lovely cats and to say thank-you to the individuals who gave a less-than-perfect cat a loving home ☺

**GINGER** was a beautiful 8-year old orange tabby female kitty who arrived at the HSOV on December 4, 2012. She had a cataract on her right eye, and it also appeared that she might be expecting kittens. Ginger had such a delightful personality and begged



for attention. She had quite a fan club on facebook and Lucy Betts (Three Sisters Rescue) happened to be one of them. Ginger found a foster home where

she was pampered until she could be transported to Cincinnati, Ohio on January 11, 2013. Ginger has had wonderful vet care and, according to Lucy, the staff at Red Bank Clinic has also fallen in love with her. Ginger just never stops purring. Lucy reported recently that Ginger must have had a false pregnancy, and that she has developed a cataract on her left eye and is now completely blind. She has been taken to a veterinary ophthalmologist and, sadly, has glaucoma in one of her eyes. So Ginger will be on eye drops to reduce pressure in that eye. Lucy reports that Ginger still keeps purring away despite everything, and that she is a wonderful cat. She is enjoying the companionship of two other Marietta kitties (Tori Grace and Etta) these days, and Ginger has a home with Lucy forever ©

**PRINCESS** was 13-years old and blind in her right eye when she was surrendered by her owner on November 3, 2012. She was a beautiful old girl with a black-and-white long smooth coat and a face that melted many hearts. We wrote on her Petfinder

description that "she would be content just to have a warm quiet spot in someone's home where she could



enjoy her golden years", and while we wanted to believe what we had written, the truth was we weren't sure that anyone would be willing to adopt Princess® We were delighted when a young lady named Dajea Hupp posted a comment on Facebook that she might want to give Princess a home. Princess was adopted by Dajea on November 15th, and she has posted pictures of Princess enjoying her new home. She writes that Princess LOVES to be brushed ③

### FABIAN and FRANCINE

were cute 3-month old kittens who were surrendered by their owner on September 17,





2012 along with two other siblings (who were adopted quickly). Fabian

and Francine both had the misfortune of being born with one blind eye <sup>(3)</sup> They were happy, playful youngsters with great personalities, but nobody came to adopt them. They were fortunate to find a foster home after they'd been in the shelter for about 4 weeks, and we really hoped for them to be adopted together. Thanks to the Friends of Feline Fund, they were spayed/neutered on December 6, 2012. Our dream home for these siblings came true when Beth Dickson Cunard picked them up on January 16, 2013 and gave them a home together.

If you haven't yet completed a Volunteer Application and signed a waiver form, you will be asked to do so before walking dogs. Sandra, or one of her volunteer assistants, will be happy to give you a tour of the shelter, a brief orientation, and an explanation of guidelines.

There are plenty of volunteer opportunities in other areas of expertise, including: animal grooming; transportation of animals to vet appointments and rescues; taking shelter animals on nursing home visits; computer work; grant writing; maintenance/shelter repairs; lawn/ grounds maintenance; fostering; sponsoring; fundraising; adoptathons; and cage/kennel cleaning.
